

DANAHER CORPORATION SUSTAINABLE SUPPLY CHAIN POLICY

1. Background. As a global science and technology company, Danaher has facilities in more than 60 countries and works with an extensive supplier base across multiple business segments. We manage a complex network of supplier relationships that are critical to business success.

2. Relevance and Guiding Principles. Danaher’s Sustainability Mission Statement emphasizes that “We drive and sustain sustainability improvements throughout our areas of impact, including with our customers (through our products, services and solutions) and in our commercial organization, supply chain, operations, workplace, communities and environment.” The expansive reach of our supply chain offers us the opportunity to drive sustainability practices across a footprint far broader than our direct operations.

3. Our Position. We view our supply chain sustainability program as a crucial component of our overall supply chain risk management efforts. While recognizing differences in laws, customs and acceptable practices around the world, we articulate our supplier expectations through this Policy, our Supplier Code of Conduct (the “Code”) and our Conflict Minerals Policy Statement. The Code is available in 21 languages and covers the following topics:

- Compliance with applicable laws and regulations
- Integrity and compliance
- Respect for human and employment rights
- Promoting the safety and health of employees
- Operating in an environmentally responsible manner
- Implementing management systems to drive compliance, risk mitigation and continuous improvement

4. Our Program. In addition to the policies referenced above, following are the key elements of our sustainable supply chain program:

- *Training our associates:* All associates classified as “Procurement” are required to annually complete a training program on human rights awareness and risk management and other sustainable supply chain topics, including human trafficking, labor and employment rights, employee health and safety, responsible environmental practices, anti-corruption, business ethics and data and IP protection.
- *Supplier sustainability assessment/monitoring:* We partner with EcoVadis to assess and monitor our suppliers’ sustainability performance:
 - The EcoVadis program assessments cover the topical areas of Environment, Labor & Human Rights, Ethics and Sustainable Procurement. In-scope suppliers are also routinely monitored with respect to key KPIs related to each of the foregoing topical areas.
 - A numerical rating is assigned to each in-scope supplier for each topical area and on an aggregated basis. The following chart indicates the supplier/operating company actions (and re-assessment frequency) that correlate to each scoring category (Danaher’s corporate procurement department maintains the methodology that determines which numerical ratings fall within each scoring category):

Scoring Category	Action Required	Timing of Next EcoVadis Assessment
Outstanding	No Action Needed	Biennial
Advanced or Engaged	No Action Needed	Annual
Medium Risk	Supplier required to submit a Corrective Action Plan (CAP) (using EcoVadis template) within 6 months	Annual
High Risk	Escalation triggered within Danaher, which will result in one or more of the following: CAP, audit and/or decision to terminate supplier relationship	Annual (for suppliers that are retained)

- *Supplier risk assessment/risk management program.* Each of our operating companies is responsible for applying our supplier risk assessment/risk management program to the operating company’s direct material suppliers, including the

following elements:

- All direct material suppliers are required to be covered by the program
- For each supplier, a numerical risk score must be calculated and updated at least every 24 months. The score must be based on the methodology maintained by Danaher's corporate procurement department, which addresses impact on Danaher's revenues; supplier financial health; operating company source limitations with respect to the supplied product; and EcoVadis Ratings score (if applicable)
- A risk management plan (RMP) is required to be developed and implemented (using Danaher's standard template) for any supplier who exceeds the risk assessment score threshold specified by Danaher's corporate procurement department.
 - A supplier emergency response plan (or SERP, which is a contingency plan outlining specific actions to be taken in the event of an emergency) is also required to be developed and implemented for any supplier whose revenue impact and source limitation scores exceeds the threshold specified by Danaher's corporate procurement department.
- Operating company leadership is required to review the direct material supplier risk assessment/risk management program status for their operating company on a regular basis.
- *Supplier support.* Operating companies should consider providing development support to chronically under-performing suppliers who are classified from a business relationship perspective (according to the methodology maintained by Danaher's corporate procurement department) as "Grow" or "Standard." Support may include but is not limited to Supplier Sustainability CAP's, Supplier Development Plans, DBS-based improvement activities, Corrective Action Requests, Process Audits and/or Business Reviews which are coordinated by the Procurement and Supplier Quality Management functional organizations.

5. Application, Governance and Communication

- a. Application. This policy applies to Danaher Corporation and all of its directly and indirectly controlled subsidiaries worldwide, and each of their respective associates.
- b. Governance. This policy has been approved by Danaher Corporation's President and Chief Executive Officer, Senior Vice President-Operations and DBS and Vice President-Global Procurement and Supply Chain.
- c. Communication. Danaher commits to communicating this Policy to its associates and suppliers through Danaher's intranet, external website, annual Sustainability Report, the EcoVadis platform and other channels.
